Mary Boatemaa Setrana is Associate
Professor of Migration and Social Change
and Director of the Centre for Migration
Studies at the University of Ghana. She is also
the IDRC Research Chair on Forced
Displacement in Anglophone West Africa.
Mary served as the lead facilitator for
Botswana's National Migration Policy.
Formerly, she served as consultant for
national migration policies in Malawi, Zambia
and Zimbabwe. Mary is a scientific committee
member of CODESRIA. She has led
international research projects supported by
the European Union, the International



Organization for Migration (IOM), the International Labour Organization (ILO), the Organisation for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), UK Research and Innovation (UKRI), and the Carnegie Corporation of New York.



Joseph Kofi Teye is a Professor of Human Geography His areas of research include: Migration and Development, Migration Policy Development, Environmental Change and Migration, Natural Resources Governance, and Agricultural Policy Processes in Africa. Prof Teye has participated (either as a PI or Co-I) in large research projects funded by international organisations, including, UKRI, DFID, ESRC, SSRC, DANIDA, EU, ACP Observatory on Migration, IOM, and

ICMPD. He was the lead consultant for the drafting of national migration policies in

Sierra Leone, Malawi, Zambia and Zimbabwe. He was also the lead consultant for the development of national labour migration policies in Ghana, Malawi and Sierra Leone. He was also the lead consultant for the drafting of an ECOWAS Action Plan for Implementing Global Compact on Refugees in the ECOWAS region.

John Narh is a Researcher on the Links for Skills Project, which is hosted at the Centre for Migration Studies, University of Ghana. John is a Human Geographer by training (MSc. Natural Resources Management) and his research interest lies in climate change and migration, natural resource governance and management, and resource policy. Specifically, John has extensive experience in how governance contexts influence migration decision at climate-vulnerable locations, natural resource conflict and resource curse, forest management, mineral development fund policy and the role of translocal practices on, and political ecology of, agroforestry, as a nature-based solution for climate change. John has also gained extensive experience in migration and translocality in West Africa through his PhD research. John has worked on large-scale migration projects funded by the European Commission, DANIDA, IDRC and UKRI. John is currently working on two European Commission funded projects: Non-Western Migration Regimes in a Global Perspective and the Link4Skills.
